2010 POST GRAD ACADEMIC PROGRAM

The University of Miami offers a select group of freshman-level courses on the campus of IMG Academies to prepare student-athletes for the demands of higher education. This gives student-athletes an opportunity to begin fulfilling College and University degree requirements by taking transferable credit courses in Writing and Composition, Economics, Anthropology, Mathematics, and Sport Administration.

- NCAA 5-year rule not affected with three or fewer courses per semester
- F1 student visa available for International students — students **must enroll** in 4 courses per semester to be eligible

Post-Grad Credit Courses Program Information

- Students apply to the University of Miami as non-degree seeking. This category has several distinct advantages:
 1. Students do not have to apply via the normal application process
 2. Students do not have to meet the normal academic requirements (GPA, SAT/ACT, essay)
 3. Students receive University of Miami credit and will be able to send an official UM transcript to potential schools and the school in which the student enrolls full-time.
- Students may enroll in up to 3 courses (9 credits) per semester while still maintaining part-time status. If a student only enrolls for courses in part-time status, this enrollment will not affect NCAA eligibility. *Prospective students should check with possible schools to determine the minimum full-time enrollment of the school to maintain part-time status.*
 1. 14.2.1.1 – Determining the start of the five-year period
For purposes of starting the count of time under the five-year rule, a student-athlete shall be considered registered at a collegiate institution (domestic or foreign; see Bylaw 14.02.3) when the student-athlete initially registers in a regular term (semester or quarter) of an academic year for a minimum full-time program of studies, as determined by the institution, and attends the student's first day of classes for that term
 2. At most institutions, 12 credits (4 courses) is minimum full-time enrollment
 3. The University of Miami offers enough courses for an international student to satisfy the requirements for the Form I-20 to apply for a student visa.
 - Students must enroll in a minimum of 12 credits (4 courses) per semester and that will trigger full-time enrollment.
 - Full-time enrollment will start a student's five-year clock with the NCAA. After completing the post-grad year at IMG Academies, students will have 4 years to play four seasons when they accept an athletic scholarship.
 4. University of Miami courses are chosen to easily transfer to other US Universities and Colleges and satisfy core requirements. University of Miami offers English Composition I & II, economics courses, sports management, and social science courses.

FALL 2010 CREDIT COURSES

APY 202 Cultural Anthropology

Cultural anthropology, including such topics as economics, politics, kinship and families, health systems, religion, and personality.

COS 211: Public Speaking

Introduction to effective audience communication including theory and extensive practice in oral presentations.

ECO 211 Microeconomics – *Special course taught live and via videoconference*

Fundamental course devoted to development and application of basic analytical tools and principles required for an understanding of major economic problems and policy alternatives available for their solution. Students also develop a business plan to apply class principles. *Instructor teaches most classes in Bradenton, however, some classes are taught via videoconference to limit the amount of travel for the instructor.*

ENG 105 English Composition I

English Composition I is designed to enhance the student's ability to communicate in written form, regardless of his or her level. Emphasis is placed on the overall process of writing in a variety of real-world situations, with ample opportunity for discussion, feedback, and revision.

ESS 201 Introduction to Sports Administration – *Taught Via Videoconference*

This course will give students an opportunity to gain an overview of sports administration through a basic introduction into the conduct and administration of sports programs at all levels. Discussions will include interscholastic, intercollegiate, and professional sports programs as well as the fitness industry.

MTH 101: Algebra for College Students

Prerequisite: Minimum Math SAT score of 550 or ACT Math score of 24 This course covers the fundamentals of college algebra, including algebraic expressions and equations, and an introduction to functions.

ENG 106 English Composition II

Prerequisite: ENG 105 English Composition I

English Composition II presents advanced approaches to written academic argument, with emphasis on textual analysis and incorporation of secondary sources. Emphasis is placed on the overall process of writing in a variety of real-world situations, with ample opportunity for discussion, feedback, and revision.

APY 201 Principles of Archaeology

History, methods, and theory of archaeology with an outline of the main characteristics of the prehistoric record throughout the world.

ECO 212 Macroeconomics – *Special course taught live and via videoconference*

Continuation of ECO 211: Course emphasis is placed on macroeconomic analysis. Areas covered include national income and employment analysis, money and banking, economic growth, and comparison of different economic systems, including the problems of developing the less developed world. Students develop and present an economic memorandum

Monday and Friday, 9:00 a.m. – 11:00 a.m., course dates to be determined

MTH 103: Finite Mathematics

Prerequisite: Minimum Math SAT score of 650 or ACT score of 29 or passing grade in [MTH 101](#).

This course is intended to provide students with exposure to a variety of mathematical ideas with an emphasis on real world applications. This course covers a selection of topics including sets, logic, counting techniques, probability, statistics, finance, and linear programming.

BIL 101, Section Y

THE NATURE OF LIFE

Professor: Y. Wang

Intended for non-majors, this course offers three main topics: the scale of life; genes and the mechanism of evolution; and organisms and their environment. The course progresses from the molecular level and concludes with an overview of major global environmental issues.

BIL 104, Section Y

GENETICS & SOCIETY

GEG 110, Section Y

POL 201, Section Y

INTRODUCTION TO AMERICAN NATIONAL GOVERNMENT

Professor: A. Simon

This course provides initial instruction on the various aspects of the process and constitution of our national government. Students develop an understanding of who governs us at the national level as well as the limitations imposed by the constitution. Issues such as individual and civil rights, federalism, the electoral process, political parties and voter behavior are also addressed.

Policies Governing Nondegree Undergraduate Status

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Enrollment in the Division of Continuing and International Education includes students who are not seeking a degree and meet the requirements as noted in each category.

Please read carefully before completing application

Conditions Applying to Continuing Education Enrollment

Enrollment in a nondegree program and/or satisfactory completion of courses does not imply admission to a degree program.

- Student may enroll for a maximum of 12 credits per semester.
- Grade point average of 2.5 must be maintained after 12 credits have been attempted or student will be dismissed.
- No more than 30 credits completed in nondegree status may be applied toward an undergraduate degree.
- Courses taken for undergraduate credit (including 500 level courses) will not be considered for graduate credit at a later date.
- Previous academic credit earned will not be evaluated until degree seeking admission is requested.
- According to academic regulations, a person dismissed or rejected from the University of Miami may not enroll for one calendar year.
- Student previously enrolled in a degree seeking status at the University of Miami is not eligible to enroll as nondegree seeking status until they have earned an undergraduate degree.

Health Insurance

All new domestic students taking six or more credit hours per semester are required to obtain adequate health insurance. The annual premium for the health insurance plan offered through the Student Health Service is added to each student's fee/s. Domestic students with alternative health insurance coverage may request a fee waiver by providing the name of the insurance company and the policy number to the Student Health Center (305-284-1652).

All new students are required to provide proof of immunization. Students who do not comply with these requirements will not be able to register for subsequent semesters.

International Students

In addition to the conditions listed above international students should note the following:

- International students in nondegree enrollment will not be issued I-20 forms.
- International students in B1 (business) or B2 (pleasure) visa status may engage in study as long as the educational activity is secondary to the principal activity for which the visa was sought.
- Enrolling in 6 credits or less constitutes secondary educational activity.

Readmission to Nondegree Status (CSX7)

Students who have previously enrolled at the University of Miami in nondegree status may request readmission by submitting this application.

Continuing Education Enrollment (CSX7)

Students who are not seeking a degree must:

- have a high school or equivalency diploma (with required minimum score)
- be out of high school for at least two years
- be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident
- if English is not the native language, submit a score of at least 550 on Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)

High School Students (CSE9)

Students who are high school juniors or seniors may apply for enrollment in the Division of Continuing and International Education. Students must submit the following:

- completed nondegree application
- recommendation from high school principal or counselor on school letterhead verifying 3.5 GPA or official transcript
- written permission from parent(s)/guardian(s)

Summer Sessions Only (CSX7-SSO)

Students less than two years out of high school must:

- be seeking a degree at another (home) university
- submit a student-in-good standing statement from home university
- and study at UM during summer sessions only
